PRIDE

School starts at 8.30 am when the gates open. You'll line up with your head of year, form and form tutor. Punctuality and attendance are important lifelong skills. Being on time helps your day to start well and sets a clear routine for your day ahead.

From lines, you will go to your form room or to assembly in the sports hall. You have form time for 25 minutes every morning. Your form tutor is your first champion in school and is there to guide and support you through your secondary journey. Your uniform and equipment will be checked to ensure that you are ready for the day.

You'll take part in inter-house activities during morning form, where Hartree, Valdez, Brindley and Ethelfleda compete to gain house points to try to be crowned champions at the end of each term. You'll take part in 'Just Read' and read texts which you may not have come across before , such as, classic literature, exceptional lives, tales of far-off lands and monumental achievements - and PRIDE - where you spend some time reviewing the week. You'll have form time again at the end of the day – but we'll cover that later.

Then, at 8.55am, the bell for period 1 sounds and you'll move to your first lesson of the day...we move on the left-hand side of the corridors and stairwells.





AMBITION

Will it be to the top floor to maths to develop your problem solving and logic skills, or to computer science where you work on digital literacy and computational thinking? You might be going to RE to find out how different religions approach days like today, or to PD to look at the diverse nature of our community and strategies to tackle prejudice in society. Maybe you'll be heading to science to investigate atoms and conduct experiments in the superlab?

You might be heading to the middle floor to English to learn about ancient Greek myths and the ancient origins of literature, or to Geography to explore the uniqueness of the UK or to History to decode the mystery of the ancient body. Maybe you're heading to creative arts and have a lesson on typography in technology, or tertiary colours in art. You might be performing in drama or interpreting graphic scores in music?

You might be heading to the ground floor to Spanish to learn about the language and culture of one of Europe's most vibrant countries. Maybe you head to technology to begin your practical in the food rooms, or to shape your projects in design. Maybe you've got PE this morning and are heading to the changing rooms to change in to your kit, ready to sharpen the skill you've been working on in badminton.

Wherever you're heading, you'll need to be switched on to learning something new and applying your learning in class and at home. The curriculum at Sandymoor is ambitious and designed to stretch and challenge you from the minute you step in the door!









RESILENCE

Phew – that was only lesson 1! At 9.45am you move to lesson 2, and then....break time! A quick check with your fingerprint that you've got your cashless system topped up and it's time for a snack – bacon butties, toast, crumpets, even a pain au chocolat are available at break time in the sports hall for year 7. Head outside and get some fresh air!

Organising your time is important again here, being ready to move to lesson 3 and being on time, ready to learn. As you head to lesson, the door is held open for you to pass through and you're courteous and polite in saying thank you as you head through. Lesson 3 is a subject you've not studied in this much depth before and it's making your brain think in different ways – you dig deep and show your resilience here and keep trying to work through the task you have. On to period 6 and when the bell sounds at 3pm, afternoon form begins. Today it's 'Debate mate' and you take part in the motion that "This house believes filters should be banned on social media!" and before you know it, the bell sounds for the end of the day... What is our House System?

Ethelfleda was and Anglo-Saxon and the daughter of King Alfred the Great. She became known as the "Lady of the Mercians", when she took over the ruling of Mercia. She founded the settlement of Runcorn and planned and led expeditions against the Danes – all at a time when women had very little power.



Dominic Valdez founded Halton Haven Hospice, which provides help to relieve the sickness, suffering and distress of people suffering from cancer and other terminal illnesses in Runcorn, Widnes and the surrounding areas. Dominic Valdez is a pioneer of social action in our local community.

Mobile phones

Students at <u>Sandymoor</u> Ormiston Academy are not allowed mobile phones, or any other form of electronic device If a students mobile phone is seen or heard anywhere on the school site, it will be immediately confiscated and taken to reception and not be returned until the end of the day

The internet and Social Media

Student must not be unkind about other students or other people on Social media

Students must be polite and kind online, just the same as when in school

If students are bullying, rude, or disrespectful online, they may be sanctioned in line with the behaviour policy

The Lesson

- Arrive to every lesson before the end of transition time
- Greet the teacher and then enter the classroom calmly and in an orderly fashion
- Follow teacher guidance and come straight in and start the R and R independently
- Be Resilient and work hard to complete all work to the best of your ability
- Pack away quickly and quietly
- Leave lesson as directed by staff and move quickly to your next lesson

Outside of school:

- Students in our uniform are representing Sandymoor Ormiston academy. If the academy becomes aware of inappropriate or disrespectful behaviour, we will sanction those concerned
- Sandymoor Ormiston Academy expect students to be courteous and polite to all members of the local community
- At the end of the school day students should make their way home (unless attending enrichment clubs) and not loiter around academy grounds and should respect the areas around the school (park, field, shops etc)
